# Worcester's Adult English Learners

- 34.7% of the population of Worcester 5 years and over, or about 60,000 residents, speak a language other than English at home.
- A little less than half of those, or 16.7% of the total population, self-identify as speaking English less than "very well."
- About 8,000 total households are considered "Limited English Speaking" households, meaning no member of the family 14 years old and over speaks only English or speaks English "very well," accounting for 11.6% of all households in Worcester.

# Worcester's Foreign-Born Population

- 22.9% of the population of Worcester, or about 40,000 residents, were born outside of the United States.
- Top countries of origin are Ghana, Dominican Republic, Vietnam, Albania, Brazil, China, India, Kenya, El Salvador, and Iraq.
- The poverty rate for the foreign-born population is 17.9%, almost the same as the overall poverty rate for the city, but the poverty rate for those who entered the country in 2010 or later is 34%.
- Vehicle availability is noticeably lower among the foreign-born population, with 16.1% having no access to a vehicle versus 6.8% for city residents overall.

## Goals of the Assessment

- Understand the greatest barriers that low-income parents encounter when attempting to learn English
- Identify the functioning capacity of the current ESOL classes being offered in the city

In order to...

- Address the barriers that exist in the current system
- Facilitate future efforts regarding the coordination and facilitation of ESOL resources in Worcester

# Methodology

- Interviews with 16 ESOL providers
- Focus group discussions with adult English learners

# Major Findings—Provider Inventory

- All providers use different placement tests and curriculums, or use none at all
- Over a third of providers have waiting lists
- Most teachers are required to have certain qualifications
- Classes are offered at various times and locations
- Childcare and transportation are consistent challenges

# Major Findings—Discussions with English Learners

- Adult English learners shared a number of motivational factors for learning English, including improving their ability to communicate, employment, supporting their children, and higher education.
- They reported several barriers to English classes, including scheduling, childcare, transportation, health, lack of income, and fear of deportation.

# Why English?

- o"I would give everything to learn English a little bit."
- "To make friends, to go all schools meeting in my kids' schools, and share my opinions in any matter."
- o"I want a better future for my family."
- o "I want to be confident and to not be discriminated against."
- o "It is necessary to live in America."
- o "We can't exist here if we don't know English."

# ESOL Network Convening, February 2017

20 ESOL providers in attendance

- Revisited 2016 findings
- Identified priorities
  - Work more closely as a network
  - Database of programs
  - Central common referral source or place learners can apply
  - Public education about what it takes to learn another language
  - Common placement
  - Common system of measurement/common measures for assessing proficiency
- Vision for Adult ESOL in Worcester
  - O Coordination, communication, sharing of resources and information, collaboration
  - Identify barriers and increase accessibility of English classes
  - Wraparound services: childcare, transportation, mental health, and bridge to employment
  - Emphasis on community-building, safety, and empathy
  - Localized, adaptable, and flexible programs


