Informational Content

MAIN IDEAS

 - Self-confidence grew

Informational Content

MAIN IDEAS & DETAILS

- Do something new for 30 days
 - It makes time more memorable
 - Took a picture every day
 - · His self-confidence grew
 - Biked to work (then climbed Kilimanjaro)
 - You can do anything for 30 days
 - Wrote a novel
 - Small changes are more sustainable
 - Stopped eating sugar (then started again)

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
Vocabulary

- Vocabulary for comprehension
 - 95% to 98% known words (Nation 2001)
- Vocabulary difficulty frequency
 - How frequent is a word in general?
 - How frequent is the word in this text?

Discourse Structure

Genre

- Lecture
 - TEDtalk
 - Invited speakers "remarkable people" who are "he world's most innovative and influential speakers."
 - Performances that "inform and inspire, surprise and delight"
 - 18 minute limit
 - · Focus on one "best idea
 - · Highly scripted and rehearsed
 - Often very personal and technical at the same time

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Discourse Structure

- Opener
 - State the idea
- Body
 - Reasons to the support idea
 - Examples
- Closer
 - · Recommend the idea

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Opener

- Opener The personal story
 - A few years ago, I felt like I was stuck in a rut, so I decided to follow in the footsteps of the great American philosopher, Morgan Spurlock, and try something new for 30 days.

Personal Experience Openers

Bahia Shehab: A thousand times no

 Two years ago, I was invited as an artist to participate in an exhibition commemorating 100 years of Islamic art in Europe...

Sarah Parcak: Archeology from space

 When I was a child growing up in Maine, one of my favorite things to do was to look for sand dollars on the seashores of Maine...

Ludwick Marishane: A bath without water

 So I grew up in Limpopo, on the border of Limpopo and Mpumalanga, a little town called Motetema...

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Organizational Discourse Markers

- There's a few things I learned ...
- The first was ...
- I also noticed that ...
- I also figured out that ...
- So here's one last thing I'd like to mention.
- I learned that ...

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Verb Tense

- There's a few things I <u>learned</u> while doing these 30-day challenges. The first <u>was</u>, instead of the months flying by, forgotten, the time <u>was</u> much more memorable. This <u>was</u> part of a challenge I <u>did</u> to take a picture every day for a month.
- There's nothing wrong with big, crazy challenges. In fact, they're a ton of fun. But they're less likely to stick.
- Have you ever wanted to write a novel?
- I <u>would never have been</u> that adventurous before I started my 30-day challenges.



Stance Markers

Speaker opinion or attitude:

	Certainty	Likelihood	Attitude
Adverb	definitely	probably	amazingly
Verb + that- clause	We know that	We believe that	We hope that
Adjective + that-clause	We're confident that	It's doubtful that	I'm shocked that

Stance Markers

Certainty

• when I made small, sustainable changes, things I could keep doing, they were more likely to stick.

Directive = you should do this

 why not think about something you have always wanted to try and give it a shot for the next 30 days.

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Stance Markers

Contrary to expectation

- The idea is <u>actually</u> pretty simple.
- <u>It turns out,</u> 30 days is just about the right amount of time to add a new habit or subtract a habit.
- <u>It turns out,</u> all you have to do is write 1,667 words a day for a month.
- There's nothing wrong with big, crazy challenges. In fact, they're a ton of fun.

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Rhetorical Questions

- Have you ever wanted to write a novel?
- Now is my book the next great American novel?
- What are you waiting for?

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Asides

 By the way, the secret is not to go to sleep until you've written your words for the day. You might be sleep-deprived, but you'll finish your novel.

Pronunciation

- Intonation and pitch
- Rate of speech

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Intonation Patterns

- Finality
- Uncertainty
- Emotion
 - Excitement
- Boredom
- Surprise
- Parenthetical ideas

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Speech Rate and Emphasis

Changes in speed and emphasis

 The first was, instead of the months flying by, forgotten, the time was much more memorable.

Unusual intonation patterns

 Now is my book the next great American novel? No. I wrote it in a month. It's awful.

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Implied Meaning

The listener must infer a speaker's indirectly stated meaning.

- Word-based inference
 - · Word choice and phrasing
- Pronunciation-based inference
- Pronunciation and delivery
- Gesture-based inference
 - Facial expression, gestures, body language

Implied Meaning

- Now is my book the next great American novel? No. I wrote it in a month. It's awful. But for the rest of my life, if I meet John Hodgman at a TED party, I don't have to say, "I'm a computer scientist." No, no, if I want to, I can say, "I'm a novelist."
