"Curiously, people often argue that when you're doing an intervention for the first time, you should invest heavily in a big evaluation to understand outcomes.

Instead, you might want to invest heavily in the process of how the thing unfolded and what you might learn to do it better next time.

You didn't know what the thing was going to look like until you got it implemented, so what's the point in designing a very structured, systematic evaluation?"

Developmental Evaluation (DE)

An approach to evaluation that is grounded in **systems thinking** and supports **innovation** by collecting and analyzing **real time data** in ways that lead to informed and ongoing **decision making** as part of the design, development, and implementation process.

DE is particularly suited for innovative approaches to solving social problems where the path to success is not clear

Matching the Question to the Evaluation Approach

Did it work? = **Summative**

How is it working? = *Formative*

What is it?* = **Developmental**


DECISION POINT

Developmental evaluation requires a certain level of readiness and commitment to learning

Developmental Evaluation Asks Different Kinds of Questions

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- What is developing or emerging as the innovation takes shape?
- What variations in effects are we seeing?
- What do the initial results reveal about expected progress?
- What elements merit more attention or changes?
- How is the larger system or environment responding to the innovation?
- How should the innovation be adapted in response to changing circumstances?



When to Use Developmental Evaluation

 For initiatives that develop in an ongoing way and will never settle into a fixed model



Knight Foundation

 Community Information Challenge
 Funding CFs to be leaders in news and
 information

 When exploring the creation of a new model, the basic ingredients of which are not yet known



Grand Rapids Community Foundation

Challenge Scholars
 Scholarships plus innovative "wraparound" supports starting in 5th grade

 When replicating a program in a new site, context, or population that requires adaptation



Sherwood Foundation

Freedom Writers
 Training program teaches educators to empower students - replicate in new school districts

 For systems change initiatives that seek to trigger change across multiple systems or in a particularly complex system

Community Partnerships Portfolio
 Place-based, multi-year, multi-sector partnership, to increase postsecondary completion rates for low income young adults

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Developmental Evaluation Involves Working Closely Together to Enhance Learning and Decision Making

Context Analysis Innovation Feedback Loops Developmental **Evaluation** Learning Facilitation **Improved** Social Ongoing Sense-Making **Innovation**

The nature of social innovation requires this integrated, responsive, and adaptive evaluation practice

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Developmental Evaluation is a Balancing Act

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- Balancing accountability and learning
- Balancing rigor with timely information
- Balancing the role of the evaluator;
 critical friend/objective observer
- Balancing reflection and dialogue with decision making and action
- Balancing the need for a fixed budget and the need for budget flexibility
- Balancing expectations about who is expected to adapt and change – funders and/or grantees



Developmental Evaluation In Practice

- Systems mapping, exploring the various "systems" and how they are connected
- Timelines and "desired realities" of how things take shape
- Adaptive evaluation plans to address new questions, new contexts, new insights
- Developing baselines, knowing outcomes and indicators will change
- Bi-weekly or monthly learning calls and meetings, often supported by learning briefs/ learning memos
- Non-traditional data collection methods (informal conversations, World Café, social networking analysis)
- Facilitated conversations and retreats to engage in dialogue, reflect on learnings, and "untie knots iteratively"*


