


SIFE Programming...It Takes a Village

- Incorporated as a city in 1853
- ♣ Population (2012) 77, 326
- ♣ Total square miles 7.4
- Public/ Private Educational Institutions
- Median household income: \$25, 983 (U.S. Average \$41, 994)
- Median family income: \$29, 809 (U.S. Average \$50, 046)
- * 73.9% of the population are hispanic or latino (Dominicans being the highest with 39.6%, followed by Puerto Ricans 22.2%)
- Home of Robert Frost and The Bread and Roses Strike of 1912.

- * Then: 2007 Spring 2011
- * Core Regular Academics ELA, Math, S.S./ U.S. History, Science, (5) Languages, etc. Regular Ed./ Honors/ AP Level Courses. SEI ELA 1-4. Special Education.
- Now: Fall 2011 Present
- Newcomers were transferred to the new high school, SY:2011-2012 INT consisted of Reg. Ed/ SEI/ SLS/ Newcomers/ SIFE.
- After approval from campus administration to move out all non-ELL's, what resulted and exist today is Newcomers (Team 1 and 2; SEI 1-4; ELL SLS; SIFE)

SIFE Course Descriptions

International High School



Introduction to ESL

Introduction to ESL #050
 5.0 credits per semester

full year course—

This course is for beginning level students who have been identified as SLIFE (Students with Interrupted or Limited Education) and who have acquired minimal or no English language skills. Students will receive an introduction to the basics of the English language with emphasis on the development of functional vocabulary and listening, speaking, reading, and writing skills. Students enrolled in this course will receive two periods a day of instruction.

Introduction to Consumer Math

Introduction to Consumer Math #235 credits per semester

- full year course—2.5
- This course is for beginning level students who have been identified as SLIFE (Students with Interrupted or Limited Education) and who have acquired minimal or no English language skills. This course is designed to build the capacity of students' understanding of basic math concepts and skills and financial literacy. Topics covered will include personal budgets, credit, banking services, understanding bills, consumer discounts, selecting job benefit options, and taxes. This course will also emphasize the development of English language literacy skills and content and academic vocabulary. Native Language support is provided.

Introduction to Social Studies

Introduction to Social Studies #102 credits per semester

full year course—2.5

This course is for beginning level students who have been identified as SLIFE (Students with Interrupted or Limited Education) and who have acquired minimal or no English language skills. Students will study the physical and human geography of the seven continents and the history of Lawrence and its role in United States history. This course will also emphasize the development of English language literacy skills and content and academic vocabulary. Native language support is provided.

Introduction to Science

Introduction to Science #303 credits per semester

- full year course—2.5
- This course is for beginning level students who have been identified as SLIFE (Students with Interrupted or Limited Education) and who have acquired few or no English language skills. Students will study the major systems of the human body and how they interrelate, diseases and prevention, and issues related to mental and emotional health. This course will also emphasize the development of English language and literacy skills and content and academic vocabulary. Native language support is provided.
