The Mission for ELL teachers:

Develop advanced to native-like English fluency in ELLs relevant to the demands of all domains of the language and the standards required by our educational system

4 Domains:

Speaking - Listening - Writing - Reading

5 Standards:

Social and Instructional (SIL) - Language Arts (LA)- Mathematics (MA)
Science (SC) - Social Studies (SS)

My Classroom:

32 elementary students with unique proficiency levels and ages, and a less-than-desirable teaching location

My Quandary:

In 30 minutes to a few hours a day, how can I increase skills across all these domains and standards in a closet in a cafeteria?

My solution, generated by reviewing research:

Do whatever I can to get my students talking and listening, as much as possible, always.

The Research (bolds mine):

"Opportunities for **practice** (output and interaction) are **necessary** to get feedback and automatize language" (WIDA, 2014)

"ELs who have had **ample** opportunity for **oral rehearsal** and **interaction** with native speakers in multiple contexts are far more equipped to reach higher levels of written discourse than ELs who had had fewer opportunities to do so." (Williams & Roberts, 2011)

"Well developed **oral proficiency** in English is associated with well-developed reading comprehension skills in English." (August, 2008)

"For ELLs especially, oral language is **foundational** to literacy development." (August and Shanahan, 2006)

To Sum:

If ELLs are to achieve linguistic parity across all domains and standards with their native English-speaking peers, they need to focus on **oracy** - the speaking and listening equivalent of literacy - first, and literacy follows naturally.
