




Why does immigration matter?

Demographics and Workforce



One quarter of all people in the U.S. are 1st or 2nd generation immigrants.

Labor Force Participation



+ Poverty, Health, and Education



+ Children, Families, and Communities



- > 25% of all children in the U.S. have at least one foreign-born parent
- > 85% of immigrants are in "mixed status" families
- > 72% of foreign-born population has resided in the U.S. for 10 years+


Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA): A Pivotal Moment






- Immigrants brought to the U.S. as children

Background, Mission, Goals

 Formed in 2013 in response to changing demographics and unmet community needs.

Mission

Create a coordinated network of effective and efficient services to assist low-income immigrants access the information and legal representation that allows them to make choices in their own best interest.

Goals:

- Increase capacity; improve access to streamlined services
- Provide timely and accurate information
- Help immigrants apply for legal status
- Develop new sources of funding

Collaborative Structure

- Made up of a diverse network of organizations and stakeholders.
- Decision-making by executive committee, comprised of funders, non-profits, and experienced practitioners.
- Funding decisions are informed by the following criteria:
 - Core competency and current capacity
 - Diversity of population served
 - Geographic reach
 - Use of best practices
 - Clear and measureable outcomes; long-term sustainability
 - Supervision structure (for legal services).
